A Message from our Pastor



Simplifying Our Faith

Several years ago during a Vacation Bible School, I led seventy-some children in a study of the Lord's Prayer. The first day, we studied the phrase "Our Father, who art in Heaven, hallowed be Thy name." From these kids (ranging from kindergartners through sixth-graders), I didn't know what to expect when I asked them why we call God "Father" or to explain the word "hallowed."

I was amazed at their creativity.

One child said that we call God "Father" because God watches over and protects us when we go on a roller-coaster ride, just like her own dad does. Another said that God is like a coach and teacher, just like his own dad who coaches and teaches kids at school. And yet another said that we call God "Father" because God loves us like all good daddies do.

When we came to the word "hallowed," I was a bit more concerned. It's not an easy word to get your brain around, especially if you can barely pronounce it (one young guy swore it had something to do with Halloween). And yet, when I posed the question, one young girl made the lesson very simple. "It means 'holy,'" she said. Sure enough, to pray "Holy is your name" seems like just the right thing to do when we are eager for God to listen to us.

Faith can slip into irrelevancy if we don't take the time to connect its most complex elements to the normal, everyday moments and occurrences of life. To equate God's protection to that of a dad holding a son or daughter tight during the ups and downs of a rollercoaster ride is so simple and yet so amazingly pertinent. And to change "hallowed" to "holy" is also a creative way to capture God's goodness toward us.

Living our faith demands our creativity in words and in actions. Creativity keeps us engaged with the God who created us and yearns to maintain a relationship with us. And just when you think you don't have a creative bone in your body, spend some time with young children and be reminded that God has placed a simple creativity in all of us.

BUILDING COMMUNITY THROUGH GIVING





As reported in the July Banner, Family Promise of Knoxville is gearing up to begin in person hosting at different congregations in January 2023. Our partners at Westside UUC will be again providing shelter for our guest families who are homeless where we will have 3

support host weeks. We will be asked to give meals and volunteers for serving, activities, and spending the night. Help will be needed for set up and cleanup on the Sundays at each end of our host week.

For this article, I want to talk about meal volunteers. A team of 2-3 people arrive at Westside around 5pm to set up the serving table (buffet style), heat up the food which consists of an entree, sides, and a dessert. Families arrive around 6pm. I enjoy the interactions with the parents and children during a shared meal. Parents and older children are asked to help with clean up, and on some evenings, an activities volunteer comes to read, help with homework, sing, or do crafts. Meal servers leave around 7pm.

FPC FELLOWSHIP GOLF



N.T. Wright examines these reactions to the virus and finds them wanting. Instead, he shows that a careful reading of the Bible and Christian history offers simple though profound answers to our many questions.
