A Message from our Pastor



#### **For Good**

In the class I've started on Sundays about some of the sayings we think are in the Bible but aren't, we first focused on this phrase: "Everything happens for a reason."

It's a phrase that seems to install God as the author of everything—including all the stuff that doesn't settle well with us, like tragedy and failures.

Safe to say, all of us around the table didn't attribute everything that happens in the world to God's authorship. While we believe God is powerful and sovereign, we seemed to land in a place where God, we think, is overwhelmingly loving and concerned for creation and not the author of our suffering.

Somewhere in the discussion, one wise voice pointed out a verse of Paul, from Romans, chapter 8, verse 28: "We know that God works all things together for good for the ones who love God, for those who are called according to his purpose."

Notice what is not in this verse. Paul doesn't necessarily place authorship of "all things" on God. Instead, he simply says that God takes "all things," regardless of who created them, and works all these things together for good.

We all can attest that, amid the trials of our lives, blessing often comes from them. God turns something nasty into something new and beautiful.

Do all things happen for a reason? No, not necessarily. But good things can come from them, no matter who authors them.

FPC has been a long-time supporter of the Knoxville Mobile Meals program delivering meals in the Farragut area on Fridays. We currently have a need for an additional team for a regular route, and also for

substitute teams. We recommend two-person teams but one person could do the route.

Duties involve once a month picking up the meals at the Mobile Meals kitchen near the News Sentinel building, delivering to 8 to 10 clients and returning the coolers to the rear of FPC. A typical route will take about 3 hours usually finishing around noon.





God and the Pandemic: A Christian Reflection on the Coronavirus and Its Aftermath By N.T. Wright

Discover a different way of seeing and responding to the Coronavirus pandemic, an approach drawing on Scripture, Christian history, and the way of living, thinking, and praying revealed to us by Jesus.

What are we supposed to think about the Coronavirus crisis?

Some people think they know:
"This is a sign of the End," they say.
"It's all predicted in the book of
Revelation."

Others disagree but are equally clear: "This is a call to repent. God is judging the world and through this disease he's telling us to change."

Some join in the chorus of blame and condemnation: "It's the fault of the Chinese, the government, the World Health Organization..."

N. T. Wright examines these reactions to the virus and finds them wanting. Instead, he shows that a careful reading of the Bible and Christian history offers simple though profound answers to our many questions.
