A Message from our Pastor



Half Truths

In the Grief Support Group we hold twice monthly at the church (first and third Mondays at 2:00), we explore many elements of loss and reactions to loss that come from inside ourselves and from others.

One of the elements we must confront as we grieve is the attempt by someone who loves us to bring comfort by quoting the Bible. It's a noble effort, but sometimes the words being said aren't entirely or even partially from the Bible. With the goal of bringing solace, sometimes people don't quite get it right when it comes to what God has said in the Biblical record or what our interpretation of God's activity is in the world.

For the families in Uvalde, Texas, who are grieving the loss of their children in that deadly school shooting recently, what would resonate for them as comforting words? "God is in control"? "God won't give you more than you can handle"? "God helps those who help themselves"?

You'd be correct in concluding that those phrases aren't entirely helpful to a grieving parent or anybody going through grief.

Starting June 26 and continuing through July, join me for an examination of some of these phrases that we think originate from the Bible but don't or don't entirely. With the expertise of author and pastor Adam Hamilton, we will study phrases like "Everything happens for a reason." What's the origin of that phrase? Is there an example of this depicted in scripture? And, how does our theology square itself with those words?

We all know that words matter. As we study these words and others like them, hopefully our own beliefs will be crystalized so that the words we use in bringing comfort to others will be grounded in authentic biblical expression.

We will meet from 10:00-10:45 on Sunday mornings in the church library starting June 26.

The final day of the Children's Enrichment Program was May 19, 2022. We had a wonderful Pre-K graduation for fifteen children followed by refreshments. As most of you know, not only was it the last day of school but also the end of CEP. I am truly honored to have been part of this program for 31 years. Over that time, we served 45-50 children each school year. Most families started their children in the ones or two-year-old class and continued through Pre-K, followed by many siblings that also attended. There were even a few parents who had been with our program as children and returned many years later to bring us their own children. For me that is the biggest compliment to CEP when parents kept returning to enroll their children.

Believe it or not, working with a preschool/parents' day out was never in my plans. It was always my intention to be a stay-at-home mom and go back to nursing when my son Michael was older. But God had a different plan for me. I started as a substitute, became the Under Twos teacher, and finally the director in 2009.

What I loved about CEP was the dedication of the staff to our children and their families. We were recognized in the community for our quality of care and the kindergarten readiness skills our children received. I will miss the program terribly, but I am looking forward to new adventures in retirement. Thank you all for the many years of support and encouragement you have always given me. Please pray for Big Fish Academy as they begin in August.

Since I am also a church member I will still be around, and of course I will continue to bowl with "Predestined to Bowl," FPC's talented bowling team!

BUILDING COMMUNITY THROUGH GIVING





Thank you to all the FPC members who donated procery/gas gift cards and baby items for our last hosting in February. Our dates for the rest of the year are July 10-17 and October 2-9 with meals and gift cards being dropped off at the grocery/gas gift cards and baby day center.

For the past two years, guest families have been staying in an extended stay hotel, and if unemployed, spending the day at the day center on Middlebrook Pike. Family Promise has been quite busy and productive, and according to the Knoxville director, 2021 was the best yet. Some stats: number of families served-82, average shelter stay-50 days, and number of families kept from becoming homeless-65.

Family Promise follows the guest families for several years after their transition into permanent housing. Families are provided with counseling, budget and financial resources, employment assistance, etc. FP staff check in regularly to help families deal with crises before they become overwhelming. The staff also helps non-guest families find resources to help them navigate the obstacles to finding housing, medical assistance, childcare, etc.

Reverend John Mark Brown, the Knoxville director of FP has set a target date of January 2023 to begin in person hosting of guest families at different churches. From now until the relaunch, there will be mission moments during worship, online and in person re-training, recruitment of new volunteers. 

Caring Corner from your Stephen Ministers

To suffer with another person does not mean to drown oneself in the other's suffering; that would be as foolish as jumping into a pool to save a sinking swimmer only to drown oneself. More to the point, I doubt that it is even possible to enter fully into another person's pain, for suffering is a profoundly solitary experience. To suffer with another person means to be there in whatever way possible, to share the circumstances of the other's life as much as one can - not to add to the world's pool of suffering, but to gain intimate understanding of what the other requires.

What we usually learn, once we are there, is that there is no "fix" for the person who suffers, only the slow painful process of walking through the suffering to whatever lies on the other side. Once there, we learn that being there is the best we can do, being there not as a cure but as a companion to the person who suffers on his or her slow journey. There is no arm's-length "solution" for suffering, and people who offer such only add to the pain. But there is comfort and even healing in the presence of people who know how to be with others, how to be fully there.

The word Chronicles literally means "the events of the days". Chronicles is a theological history which intends to inspire Israel once more to be a great people obedient to God. Into the world of the Diaspora, the people of Israel are called to be faithful witnesses. Their place of worship, the Temple, was to be the focal point everywhere. The Temple was not a tribal tabernacle, the house of holiness for the God of the universe.

We will see a United Kingdom under David who prepares the way, and Solomon who builds the Temple. After the death of Solomon, we will see the deterioration and division of Israel, the fall of Jerusalem and the destruction of the Temple, the exile, and God's grace shone to Israel through the Persian King Cyrus II, whose edict allowed Israelites to return to Jerusalem in Judah to rebuild the house of the Lord, the God of Israel.
